## Youth Complete Challenging Trip



Seven Cokesbury youth and two adults returned Saturday from a week-long trip to Camp Red Cloud located near Lake City, Colorado. The two day trip each way included an overnight bedding stop at St. Stephens UMC in Amarillo.

At Camp Red Cloud, we went backpacking in the beautiful mountains for four days and three nights. With us were three young adults from Red Cloud who were the guides of both the physical and spiritual aspects of the adventure. We carried all our gear including tents, bedding, food and water on our backs as we hiked a total of about 15 miles at elevations ranging from 9,000-12,000 feet. We hiked up to above the tree line with snow along the trail in many places. Night time temperatures were about 40 degrees under beautiful star-filled skies.

Each day included quiet solo time near breakfast for studying the Bible and discussion time around the fire at night to review our morning's readings. The adventure was challenging, both physically and spiritually. Our last full day in the mountains included a five hour solo time away from others for Bible study and reflection, during which we had a brief hail storm.

In addition to the backpacking, the group participated in team building games in which we learned to build confidence and trust others.
