A survey in 2003, found that 8 out of 10 workers were not happy in their jobs. Additionally, motivational coach, Ed Foreman reports that most heart attacks occur on Mondays between 8:00 and 9:00 a.m. These two findings suggest that people are not happy with their work. We have all heard a coworker say, or maybe we have said it ourselves, "I wish I didn't have to go to work today."

So, here I am on Monday morning shaking in my boots--so to speak. However, work does not have to kill us. There is a verse in Ecclesiastes that says, "I saw that there is nothing better for people than to be happy in their work. That is why we are here!" (Ecclesiastes 3:21)

Here is an insight: Solomon did not say, "There is nothing better for people than to have work that makes them happy." The emphasis is on your being happy in your work, not on your work making you happy.

I have seen people bored with great jobs--even very high paying ones.

A recent TV story reported that the CEO of Waste Management Corporation (a garbage hauling business) visited a man who was cleaning the worst portable toilets. Instead of being unhappy, this man was cheerful, ready to do his work, and doing it very well. The work did not make him happy. He went into it with an attitude of happiness.

Your job probably won't change. It is what it is. But you can take steps to change the way you approach your work, steps that help you find satisfaction in your work. Let me suggest you look for something rewarding in your job, and secondly, take the joy of the Lord with you to work. Do not leave it at the doorstep. Try it.

Remember SeAM on First Sunday

August 1 is the first Sunday of the month and the traditional time for Cokesbury members to bring items for the Southeast Area Ministries (SeAM) food pantry. Items can be left in the large plastic tubs outside the narthex or in the Commons. Items in short supply are canned tomatoes, peanut butter and macaroni and cheese.

Your contributions are needed as the demand is still high due to children being home from school. Through the first six months of 2010, SeAM has provided food to 4,510 clients. These clients have received a total of 69,300 pounds of food and toiletries.

You can help others through SeAM in several ways. In addition to donating food or plastic bags, you can donate clothing, household items or furniture to the Thrift Store. Small amounts of clothing or household items can be left in the kitchen in the "soup can" by the refrigerator. For furniture pickup, call Rob Bradley at 281-992-2604. Or you can take your donations to the Thrift Store located on Highway 3 between College and Edgebrook Monday-Saturday 9:30-3 p.m.

A final way you can directly help SeAM is to volunteer along with your other Cokesbury members. Help Build the Last House for Haiti

Want to help build Cokesbury's last house for Haiti? We will build it on Saturday, July 31 beginning at 7 a.m. We will work until completion or until the heat wins. Everyone is welcome to help. Bring any electric or battery-powered drills you have.

Cokesbury has built two houses for Haiti so far. The Methodist Youth Fellowship built the first one and it is the one that is free-standing in the back parking lot. It was nearly fully constructed to demonstrate what the finished product looks like. However, the walls are only partially nailed together to ease breaking it down.

The Girl Scouts constructed the second house. The walls, floor and bed platforms were built and painted and stacked. They are under the tarp next to the MYF-built house. However, the house was not erected.

The house to be built on July 31 will be done like the Girl Scout house with walls, floor and roof support completed but not assembled. After the last house components are assembled, the MYF house will be separated into its major pieces. All three of the houses will then be removed from Cokesbury property and stored with other groups' buildings, awaiting shipping to Haiti.

Re-Enroll in Kroger's Neighbor Program

Thanks to all of you who participate in Kroger's Neighbor to Neighbor program and have designated Cokesbury UMC as your receiving organization. For the 2009-2010 year ending April 30, Cokesbury received a check of \$441.61 from Kroger.

Kroger's policy is that organizations and individuals have to re-enroll every year. Cokesbury has re-enrolled. We just need you as individuals to re-enroll. To do this, take the letter from the table outside our narthex doors to Kroger. The letter has the barcode for Cokesbury that will link your Kroger Plus card to Cokesbury for the upcoming year (July 2010 to April 2011). Once the letter is scanned one time, you only have to use your Kroger plus card as you normally do. Then purchases made until April 30, 2011 will be eligible. Certain purchases such as fuel are excluded from the program. Thanks for your help.
